Waitangi Day



Every year on 6 February, New Zealand marks the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi in 1840. In that year, representatives of the British Crown and over 500 Maori chiefs signed what is New Zealand's founding document. The day was first officially commemorated in 1934, and it has been a public holiday since 1974. Like ANZAC Day on April 25th this holiday is always on the day that it falls. e.g. This year it falls on a Saturday, therefore that is the day of the holiday.

Happy Chinese New Year

Lunar Chinese New Year 2010 - Year of the Tiger 庚寅

The Chinese New Year Festival Starts on February 14th 2010.

Chinese people have been part of New Zealand's cultural make-up since the 1860's, when the Dunedin Chamber of Commerce sought workers for the Otago gold mines. From a population of just over 1,200 in 1867, the Chinese/Taiwanese population has grown to more than 145,000—a vital part of our multicultural society.

On January 6th, 2010 New Zealand Post issued a series of stamps celebrating the Chinese New Year. They also issued stamps in 2009 celebrating the year of the ox.

Changes to the 'Road User Rule'—Whether you drive, ride, cycle, or walk in New Zealand, changes to the 'road User Rule' that came into effect from 1 November 2009 apply to you. Most high-profile change is the ban on the use of hand-held mobile phones while driving.

Another change includes: riders of mopeds and motorcycles must switch their headlamps on during daylight hours, unless manufactured before 1 January 1980.

There are 24 amendments to the 'Road User Rule'

Connecting newcomers locally

Citizenship requirements change in April—don't miss out if you are eligible

At the moment, if you received permanent residence or had a successful application accepted by Immigration New Zealand **before** 21 April 2005, you could be eligible for a grant of citizenship after living here for three years.

If you applied for and received permanent residence on or **after** 21 April 2005, you have to be resident in New Zealand for five years before becoming eligible for a grant of citizenship.

However, from 21 April 2010, everyone will have to be resident for five years before becoming eligible for a grant of citizenship, no matter when they got permanent residence.

That means that if you meet the three year requirement and don't put in an application before 21 April next year, you will not be eligible until you have lived here for five years, not three.

Visit the Citizenship website www.citizenship.govt.nz where you can obtain more information and check whether you are eligible for citizenship by using the Online Calculation Tool. Alternatively you can phone the Citizenship Office on 0800 22 51 51.

We flew to Stewart Island in a tiny aeroplane the day before Christmas.



At Stewart Island you walk lots of places. One day we walked to Golden Bay wharf to catch the little water taxi to go to Ulva Island. It only took 5 minutes to get to Ulva Island which is famous for the lovely birds there. Even though you can't always see them you can hear them all around you and above you in the trees.

In the bush near the wharf when we were coming back to wait for the boat to pick us up we saw the **Saddleback**. I wonder if you can see how the Saddleback got that name.
